
Our specific aims are: -

Leaving School

Nursery and Year 1 – Year 3 children should not be expected to go home themselves. In the interest of safety, all Year 1 – Year 7 children will not be allowed to leave the premises during school hours unless a written request / phone call is received. Parents are then expected to personally collect their child from school. Children must be signed out and the reason for collection recorded by the parent at the main school office.





Breakfast Club

Our new, supervised breakfast club is available between 8.00am – 9.00am daily. Children can attend the club on the day(s) of their choice with payment being made on the day. Healthy options include cereal, toast, fruit, milk, water and fruit juice.

Break Time

Our school encourages and promotes a healthy eating policy that is well supported by parents. At break-time only healthy snacks are encouraged. Nursery staff prepare break for the children daily. Pupils in Year 1-7 can choose to buy healthy options prepared daily on site in our 5* rated canteen.

School Meals: Year 1 - 7

Our school canteen offers healthy, balanced and nutritious meals at lunch times daily. Children in Year 1-3 pre-order their meals via the school app for the week ahead. Year 4-7 children simply pay for their meals on the day(s) of their choice.

Packed Lunch

Children from P1 – P7 can bring a packed lunch instead of taking a school dinner. These will be eaten in their classrooms, supervised by staff. Parents can decide what to include in these, but we would always encourage healthy choices at break and at lunch.

Food Allergies

We are happy to meet the needs of all our children. Canteen staff are generally able to accommodate individual pupil requirements. We will always ask parents to make allergies known and discuss this with you at the start of each academic year or where changes in dietary requirements arise.

ICT

All classrooms are fitted with interactive boards, and we have a dedicated computer suite with 30 machines. All children have access to a range of interactive resources including iPad's, laptops, beebots, and roamers. E-safety is a critical component of our work, and our children are taught how to keep safe by learning how to use technology responsibly in school and at home.



Music

Music is vibrant in our school. Children actively engage in class music, and many perform in our school orchestra and choirs in and out of school. Specialist tuition from EA tutors in Strings, Brass and Woodwind is available at an additional charge. Pupils routinely choose to participate in the external Associated Board / Trinity graded examinations successfully throughout the year.

Health, Well-Being and Physical Education

Children are encouraged to adopt healthy habits and to learn about mental wealth. They actively participate in P.E, Dance, Games, Athletics, Swimming, Football, Netball and Hockey etc. A wide range of after school activities supplement our curricular programme throughout the year.



Drama

Drama is actively promoted both in class and as part of our after-school program of events. What our children can achieve in our major Nursery and Primary school Christmas productions is truly quite remarkable. Staff expertise in performing arts is freely shared to bring the best out of our young people on stage.

Religious Education

Collective worship at morning assembly and the curriculum for religious education are entirely non-denominational. Parents who do not wish their child to participate in assembly or R.E. lessons have the right not to. Any such request can be made directly to the Principal.

Shared Education

We enjoy a well-established link with St. Patrick's PS, Loughguile. The aim of the project is to improve children and young people's health, well-being and life opportunities. The core values of equality, respect and tolerance are intrinsic in all aspects of the work between our schools and across all year groups.

PDMU

This is a strong feature of our work in school. Children are encouraged to learn about themselves and to understand how they think and learn best. Strong emphasis is placed on physical and emotional health. Of paramount importance is safety and well-being. External providers often support us in this critical area.



In Focus: Pastoral Care

We offer an environment which is child centred, where every child is valued, treated as an individual, is inspired, and is given the opportunity to acquire knowledge and extend and enrich his/her experiences. The care of our children is paramount.



The positive attitudes and excellent standards of behaviour we enjoy are a direct result of children who:-

3. Feel safe and secure within an atmosphere of honesty, openness and trust.
4. Are supported, nurtured and encouraged to reach their full potential.

Our children know that their worries and concerns will be listened to sensitively and sympathetically. Mrs Ballantine (Designated Teacher), in conjunction with the principal and staff, ensure that each child is encouraged to respond personally and appropriately in situations that directly affect their welfare. - Cruse Bereavement Counselling


In Focus: Special Educational Needs


We aim to meet the individual needs of our children, taking account of their personal challenges, experiences, background and learning styles. Our 'Special Educational Needs' policy and provision ensures that children can access the curriculum at a level best suited to their stage of development.



Mrs Talbot, as Vice-Principal & Learning Support Coordinator, routinely monitors the progress of each child in conjunction with class teachers. Needs are identified as early as possible, and the appropriate support put in place. Parents will be invited to contribute at each stage.

Children identified for specialist support will have a '*Personal Learning Plan*' with clear targets that will be monitored carefully. Referrals from school to our Educational Psychologist and the various external support agencies are routine. In association with parents, the priorities for each child will be identified and discussed openly as the relevant support options are implemented.
